All graduate students at UCI pay in-state tuition; non-residents of California and international students pay an additional non-resident tuition assessment, as shown above.

If you are classified as a non-resident of California for tuition purposes, you will be responsible for paying non-resident tuition as an out-of-pocket expense unless you have a financial support package that covers that expense. (All financial support offers for PhD admission in the School of Social Sciences include at least one year of non-resident tuition.) Teaching Assistants employed at 25% time or more (10-20 hours per week) will receive in-state tuition remission during each quarter of employment. The quarterly value of the tuition remission is currently \$4,098 both for California residents and non-residents. TA appointments also cover student health insurance (currently valued at \$1,307 per quarter) as a benefit of employment, leaving a balance due of \$256.50 per quarter. This balance—the so-called “local fees”—is not covered for graduate students—TA’s or students receiving fellowship support—in the School of Social Sciences. Non-resident tuition cannot be waived for Teaching Assistants; non-residents of California and international students are therefore responsible for full payment of the quarterly tuition assessment unless this expense is covered on their behalf through a fellowship or some other form of financial aid.

Non-residents of California and international students employed as Graduate Student Researchers (GSRs) at 25% time or more will receive full payment of in-state tuition and fees, student health insurance and non-resident tuition during each quarter of employment.

Non-resident tuition for international doctoral students who advance to candidacy for the Ph.D. is reduced to zero in the term immediately following advancement. This benefit extends for nine consecutive quarters following advancement, whether the candidate is enrolled or not enrolled. If the candidate has not completed all requirements within nine quarters following advancement, non-resident tuition charges will apply beginning in the tenth quarter following PhD advancement.

Please read all financial support offers you receive very carefully. If your offer does not cover all in-state tuition and fees and non-resident tuition, determine how much you are expected to contribute to the annual cost of your degree program. You may contact the
